

Dynamic Bond Fund

PERFORMANCE SUMMARY

The Dynamic Bond Fund returned 0.09% (Institutional, Income shares net of fees) and 0.07% (Institutional, Accumulation shares net of fees) in February. Year-to-date the Fund has returned 0.67% (Institutional, Income shares net of fees) and 0.62% (Institutional, Accumulation shares net of fees).

Tech stocks led a broad market rally fueled by advancements in artificial intelligence, while bond indexes faced challenges as yields rose. U.S. credit spreads tightened, and developed sovereign bond yields rose, while the dollar strengthened. In the U.S., the 10-year Treasury rose 34 bps to 4.25% as unexpectedly resilient inflation and strong economic data challenged market expectations of rapid rate cuts. In Germany, the 10-year bund yield rose 25 bps to 2.41%. In the U.K., 10-year Gilt yields rose 33 bps to 4.12%, while 10-year Japanese government bond yields fell 2 bps to 0.71%.

Contributors

- Exposure to the cash interest rate in the US, from carry
- Holdings of investment grade and high yield corporate credit, as spreads tightened and through carry
- Holdings of securitized credit, primarily non-Agency Mortgage Backed Securities

Detractors

- Long exposure to US duration, as yields rose
- Long exposures to the Japanese yen, as it depreciated against the US dollar
- Long exposure to Australian and Canadian duration, as yields rose

That issue is assumed to be sold the following business day (priced at a yield equal to the current day fixing rate) and rolled into a new instrument. MONTH IN REVIEW


PIMCO GIS Dynamic Bond Fund's performance in February was slightly positive, driven by contributions from spread strategies while currencies were roughly flat and duration strategies detracted.

Interest rate strategies were negative last month. Long exposure to US duration detracted from performance as US interest rates rose over the month. Volatility in the rates market remains elevated as expectations of market rate cuts continue to fluctuate. Elsewhere, long exposure to dollar block duration such as Canada and Australia also detracted as rates rose.

Spread strategies were positive in February. Long exposure to securitized credit, particularly non-Agency MBS and CDO/CLOs contributed as spreads tightened. Additionally, long exposure to investment grade and high yield corporate credit also contributed to performance as corporate credit spreads tightened.

Currency strategies were roughly flat last month. Long exposure to the Japanese Yen detracted over the month as the Yen depreciated versus the USD. Overall, the Fund has kept its overall exposure to currency risk at a modest level, as our near term conviction remains low versus the potential for volatility.

PORTFOLIO POSITIONING

The portfolio is positioned across a diverse set of global opportunities in developed and emerging market economies. **Interest Rates**

We have reduced duration over the month, yet still favor long US interest rate exposure versus other global developed rates as a hedge against a risk asset sell-off. Elsewhere, the Fund maintained long exposures to Canadian and Australian duration given the potential for rates to decline more rapidly due to their higher rate sensitivity.


Credit Spreads

We see value in securitized credit including Non Agency MBS as the sector is relatively insulated from key risks facing global markets. We also continue to hold select Agency MBS as a way to maintain a high quality, very liquid position that offers a "safe spread" over US Treasuries. Within corporate credit, we are selective in our exposure to high yield credit and prefer defensive non cyclical sectors while still slightly favoring financials, along with telecommunications and healthcare for investment grade credit.

Currencies

We remain tactical with currency positioning, holding modest long positions across a diversified selection of both DM and EM currencies. The fund remains diversified across a basket of EM countries including Brazil and Turkey. Additionally, the fund recently initiated a short position to the Chinese Yuan amidst negative risk sentiment on the country and an uncertain domestic economic outlook.

OUTLOOK AND STRATEGY

Growing economic and political headwinds as well as still-sticky inflation trends are, in our view, likely to challenge the possibility of a soft-landing. Although supply chain improvements can be expected to continue moderating inflation, other near-term trends - such as the resumption of student loan payments and higher gas prices – could weaken the otherwise resilient U.S. consumer. These factors, when combined with tight labor markets and sticky wages, are likely to keep recession risks elevated.

The GIS Dynamic Bond fund continues to emphasize flexibility. as the strategy seeks to provide investors a well-equipped fixed income process that can be nimble in a challenging market environment. DBF utilizes a time tested approach that has allowed the fund to remain resilient across a variety of market cycles, including periods of rising rates. The strategy reacts tactically as yield curves continue to shift around the globe.
